In view of, because of, considering. E.g. In light of this evidence, the original hypothesis was rejected.

IN THE HANDS OF

Controlled or owned by someone. E.g. The nation's economy lies in the hands of millions of private investors.

Think of sth, especially as a warning. E.g. It is important to bear in mind the difficulty involved with this approach.

IN ITS OWN RIGHT

Because of its own special qualities. E.g. The company is now independent and successful in its own right.

In a similar way/of a similar type. E.g. The new policy was designed along the lines of the previous one.

IN THE LONG RUN

After a lengthy period of time. E.g.

Although the company is losing money

now, it should make a profit in the long run.

Action that is helpful/harmful. E.g. Darwin took this idea a step further in his theory of evolution.
